On the topic of Calgary, the new venue in the form of the Convention Centre was rather impressive and was on most counts an improvement over the previous facility. With the Radisson as the main bunkhouse, the quality factor went up again but the convenience factor for getting in and out of the place was not a plus. Parking was a price consideration.

Having two workshop sessions running in one room was a serious problem and having to pass through one area to get to the other was also awkward and annoying. Other than that, the facility seemed to work well. A number of 'innovations' were tried and met with mixed reviews - change bothers some and seping things the same irritates others - which only goes to that one can't please all of the people all of the time. 1996 ACWDA ELECTIONS

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Had at least some response to the philosophizing done about supporting Canadian events - a little is better than the none that is usually the norm for comment and reaction. The matter of prices was raised but the figures provided were correct. A three day pass at 'Calgary CDS I' was \$45.00 and at 'CCDS V' it is \$50.00 without GST - that is an 11.1% increase, an increase but not exactly exorbitant.

The fact of the matter is that, at this time, we can count on only ONE Canadian event in 1996 - nothing else is locked in or guaranteed. Event directors do not make bundles of money - at least not in Canada. Most of the 15 festivals held Canada to date have either made no money or have lost oney. That doesn't go on forever. If it looks like there is not enough interest, there will be no more events.

That doesn't mean that we have to give the event directors carte blanche in terms of what they do. If we are fair, firm, and forthright in our comments and our complaints, and if the comments are made to improve rather than simply to put down, they have a chance of being heeded. If the message is strong enough and reasonable enough, any director who wants to survive and stand a chance of improving will listen. Anyone who doesn't deserves the consequences.

By the same token, the 'voting' or 'supporting' CW public deserves the consequences of its actions. Should they be unreasonable or unthinking, the results could be drastic in nature - like no events within easy driving distance, with no expenses in Canadian dollars. Let's make certain we do what is necessary to ensure the type of events we want. If we don't want any, the solution is easy. If we do, the answer is slightly more difficult - but within our control. Think on it - and act accordingly - we do affect each other with our individual and collective actions.

NTA Teaching Manual-Syllabus Available

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TEACHING HINTS: Adapted from the NTA's Teacher's Manual

- 1. Keep it Simple use language that is easily understood. Terms understood by one person might be misunderstood by another.
- 2. Emphasize the benefits of learning good technique right from the start. It is difficult to unlearn bad habits.
- 3. Be positive and give students much encouragement, but keep it sincere.
- 4. Smile, be genuinely interested in your students, remember their names, and be a good listener.
- 5. Follow-up on all questions, even if research is needed to find the answer.
- 6. Start class on time.
- 7. Prepare lesson content in advance. Don't try to teach too much in one session. This could result in an overload of information and not much will be retained.
- 8. Start from the simple and move to the complex.
- 9. Students must first master the basic footwork, balance, rhythm, timing of a dance. Fundamentals must come first.
- 10. Students will make mistakes. No one learns without making mistakes. Don't expect perfection. Teach them how to recover from mistakes and keep on dancing.
- 11. Allow students to talk, ask questions, but avoid arguments. Show respect for their opinions.
- 12. Learning to dance should be fun. Relax and enjoy it with your students

TERMINOLOGY AND STANDARDIZATION OF LANGUAGE: Use of a common language or at least recognizing and interpreting differences in terms lends credibility to the CW dance form. Whether we use the common terminology or just make ourselves and our students familiar with it, we and our chosen dance form all stand to benefit. Continuing this month, another page of Dance Terminology is included.



- 3,&,4 place Right, step back L, together R, step fwd L (Shuffle rhythm)
- 5,6 (Rock step, coaster step) Rock fwd R, step in place
- 7,&,8 L, step back R, together L, step fwd R (Shuffie rhythm)
- 1,2 (Side rock, cha cha in place) Rock side L, step in
- 3,&,4 place R, cha cha in place L,R,L, or spin ½ or 360 degrees left.
- 5,0 (Side rock, cha cha in place) Rock side R, step
- 7,&,8 place L, cha cha in place R,L,R, or spin ½ or 365 degrees left.



- 7,&,8 L, step back R, together L, step fwd R (Shuffle rhythm)
- 1,2 (Side rock, cha cha in place) Rock side L, step in
- 3,&,4 place R, cha cha in place L,R,L, or spin ½ or 360 degrees left.
- 5,6 (Side rock, cha cha in place) Rock side R, step
- 7,&,8 place L, cha cha in place R,L,R, or spin ½ or 38 degrees left.

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

FROM THE PREDITOR

'96 CANADIAN COMPS COMMENCE IN CALGARY

The first in the series of Canadian competitions and festivals gets 'out of the chute' April 12 to 14 with the Calgary Country Dance Stampede. The 1996 season had a potential of six events in the Canadian circuit - and that is really the western Canadian, prairie, or Alberta with a touch of Saskatchewan circuit if one wants to get quite specific and technical. From that promising potential, there may be only three left. There seems to be a message in there somewhere.

For years, the only opportunity for Canadians to participate in CW festivals was to be found south of the border. From 1989 to 1992 there were just four such events in Canada, one per year. 1993 spawned four events, 1994 had four, 1995 saw a high of five events in Canada (in Alberta to be exact), and 1996 appears to slipped back to three - looks like that is all we get, IF WE ARE LUCKY.

Colitics, personalities, and economics can get twisted around till it's hard to remember why one is involved with - or indignant about - something. Canadian festivals have a tenuous grasp on existence at best and we need to be careful if we want them to survive. We have to decide what is really important and what we want to have available to us.

Money is always an issue - there's never as much as we would like and things keep going up in price. When looking at the cost of attending events, one does have to be honest and realistic about what one can afford. It is only fair and just as necessary to be honest and realistic about what it costs to put on an event. Anyone with elementary arithmetic can do a quick, if not completely accurate calculation on the dollars brought in at the door - and that looks good on the surface. Far fewer have any real idea or appreciation as to the expenses of putting on a festival. The other festivals have not yet posted their 1996 rates but the Calgary Country Dance Stampede's rates for a three day pass this year are only \$5.00 higher than in 1992; the others will most likely be similar. Compare that with a long drive - or flight - and paying most of your expenses in American dollars.

The perennial politics and personalities are always are a factor but these also must be tempered if we want to keep home grown events on our calendar. Complaining over the fence to our neighbour or over a beer to our buddies does thing to resolve anything. If there are perceived problems, arey need to be addressed - but addressed in an appropriate manner and an opportunity must be provided for a response.

We do vote with our feet and our dollars. We need to be very careful that we don't vote ourselves out of Canadian festivals.

We need to support ourselves. If there is a problem, be fair, honest, and open with the people involved. Do it individually or collectively. Do it appropriately. Allow time for the problem to be addressed. Be positive and offer suggestions. Be a part of a solution rather than part of a problem. Support Canadian events unless you want to see them disappear.

ON TO OTHER ITEMS

- >>Take note of the idea for teams in Just Wanna Dance and respond if you are interested.

T22: TEACHER TALK - INSTRUCTOR INFORMATION

About two years ago I was dancing with Beth Emerson, a Master Division dancer from St. Louis. Afterwards, as we sat and talked, she mentioned that every Canadian man she has danced with starts the leads for turns LATE!

Being a typical male dancer, my ego wouldn't let me accept Beth's statement. I thought she must be referring to beginning dancers, not us accomplished competition dancers. WRONG!!

Two months ago, while teaching a lesson on turn technique

for ladies, I had the most unsettling revelation hit me like lightning from the gods. Virtually every one of us, including myself, lead late. And this time, I really understand what that means.

As an instructor, here is a simple exercise you can do with your class. Have all the ladies line up in a single line across the floor. Line up the men about six feet behind the ladies, as if they were doing some sort of line dance. Get them to stand in "third position" with the right foot behind and at 45 degrees to the left foot. Their weight is on the front foot. Now ask them to rock their weight backward onto the back foot, then forward onto the front foot. Repeat this ten times or so until a rhythm is established of transferring weight without changing foot position. (This by the way is the footwork for pivot turns).

Now ask them to start again, but this time rock back, rock forward, rock back, and as they do, do a ½ turn to the left AS THEY ROCK BACK. Without breaking rhythm, rock forward, rock back, rock forward, do a ½ turn to the left as they rock back.

When done correctly, your students will be spinning on the ball of the right foot AS THEIR WEIGHT IS BEING TRANSFERRED ONTO THE RIGHT FOOT. Since all turns start in the upper body first, the shoulders need to be turning BEFORE the weight is fully on that back foot.

Now picture a man and a woman dancing two step together. They are in closed frame position. He preps her on beat 3 and leads an inside turn to cuddle or sweetheart or whatever (Ed. ACWDA and NTA guidelines suggest 'Wrap') on beat 5. The lady steps on her right foot on beat 1 (same as our backward rock above). She steps on her left foot on beat 2 (same as our forward rock above). The man preps her as she steps beat 3 onto her right foot again, then leads the turn on beats 4,5 AFTER HER WEIGHT IS FULLY ON THE RIGHT FOOT!. But we saw in our exercise that she needs to be turning her shoulders BEFORE the weight is fully on her right foot. So how do we do this, you ask?

Easy, once you, as an instructor, understand the mechanics of movement and time. A beat in music is a instantaneous moment in time when the drum stick hits the drum. But when we take a step, we do not step instantaneously; we move through a period of time. For dance purposes, we can pretend that a beat is a small period of time through which we move. Now stand with your feet together, ready to step forward. Beat 1 starts as soon as you can start to move one of your feet. Beat 1 ends when you step down onto the floor with that moving foot and start to put weight on it. Beat 2 starts as you continue to weight the first foot and start to move the second foot. Beat 2 ends when the second foot hits the floor and starts to become weighted. Beat 3 starts immediately as you continue to put all your weight on that

second foot and start to move the first foot again. This is when the prep should start. Beat 3 ends AS THE FOOT HITS THE FLOOR AND BEGINS TO RECEIVE WEIGHT Beat 4 starts while you are still transferring weight to that first foot and starting to move the second foot again. This is when the lead for the turn has to start - before the first foot is fully weighted.

After understanding this, when I watch Canadian men lead turns, I can clearly see that they wait until the lady's foot is fully weighted before they start their lead and then the ladies have to work to get turned instead of it being the effortless motion that it should be. A man should be able to lead his partner using only a single fingertip touching the lady's hand. He should not have to push or crank her through the turn. And guess what, men, 99 times out of 100 it is our fault, not the lady's.

I believe this whole situation got started back in the days when two step was taught using the terms: "quick, quick, slow, slow" or "slow, slow, quick, quick", instead of numbers: "1, 2, 3, 5". The problem is that "quick, quick, slow, slow" only does one thing. It tells you only how long the foot is weighted. It does not give your students the timing for each step, or the timing for leads. Most of us who are currently teaching, learned from instructors who either taught "quick, quick, slow, slow" or who were taught themselves with that terminology.

Here is a short example of what happens. The instructor satisfier on the first slow and turn the lady on the second slow. So the student preps as he steps first slow, holds the prep through the slow, then starts his lead as he steps second slow. Guess what the student just did. He prepped on beat 3, held the prep on beat 4, and started the lead on beat 5. He is a full beat late. The lady has planted all her weight on her right foot and now has to work to get turned. Think about this, play with it, and discover it for yourselves, and your students will thank you. And Beth, I thank you.

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MORE TOWARD A CODE OF ETHICS

The Country Western Instructors Cooperative -CWIC- is a small and relatively new organization that was "born from a desire to retain the country western dance styling that has become known as an American folk tradition", and to "keep the country in country dancing'. There is no doubt as to the philosophical differences that permeate the CW dance scenared this item is not intended to enter into that particular

debate. The pertinent issue is one of conduct and ethics chich is critical to any organization or community. CWIC has code of Conduct for its instructors that reads as follows:

- 1: Prepare for all classes
- 2: Teach dance floor etiquette
- 3: Dress in western attire
- 4: Never become intoxicated
- 5: Never criticize other instructors
- 6: Keep classes fun and relaxed
- 7: Observe authentic/traditional country style dancing

CWIC also makes a statement on ethics. While it relates more to line dancers, there is a message for all. Reference is made to choreography, striving for creativity, and the pride of seeing one's own work on the floor being done by others. Bragging is not kosher. Taking credit for one's own effort and materials is acceptable; taking credit for that of others is not. Give credit where it is due when others' input, effort, and contribution is involved. The statement ends with a reminder that CWIC has an Ethics Committee and how nice it would be if the members had a minimum of work to do.

NOTES FROM THE MARCH EXECUTIVE MEETING

- >>Draft copies of rules for line dance and team competition in smaller venues from the November rules meeting in Edmonton were distributed, discussed, and left for further work.
- >>The status of further NTA workshops (for but not restricted instructors) was discussed. The initiative involving a operative effort in Calgary in conjunction with ACWDA and other parties involved has apparently stalled. Efforts will continue to carry on with the next levels of workshops.
- >>Lammle's has agreed to provide a 15% discount off regular priced items to members beginning in April. The last of the membership cards should be out by then.
- >>Zone activities have been at a low level. Attendance at meetings, including that of Zone reps to provincial executive sessions, has been less than outstanding.
- >>ACWDA will start exploring an instructor accreditation program using NTA materials as a primary guideline.
- >>Consideration of a 'Hall of Honour' concept will be explored to recognize and honour those who have contributed to the development of CW dance in Alberta.
- >>The plans for 'June Annuals' are looking for things to be centred around workshops, two dances/social sessions, the AGM, and the Instructors Forum and the 5th birthday/anniversary party. The goal is to highlight and promote 'home grown' instructors focussing on 'Social Survival Stuff' in the workshop sessions.
