much - or perhaps anything - about dancing. You may look at what you have been teaching and feel you haven't taught very much. It is a sign of good instructors when their students can do what has been presented and do it well. It is not how much material you have introduced but how well your students dance that is important.

As instructors, know your material well. Keep your students coming to class by helping them become good dancers, not by the amount of material you cover. Students' biggest complaint is that too many teachers show too much.. It is not how much you teach but how well you get it across to the students and how well they can do it.

SET GOALS FOR STUDENTS: An efficient instructor takes the responsibility to maintain and develop students' interest by giving them goals to accomplish. Goals for Students include: to perform dancing skills satisfactorily; to learn current dances; to be at ease and enjoy dancing; to have the necessary knowledge of music, school figures, and lead and follow.

Teachers <u>do not teach</u>. They merely <u>set the stage</u> for people to learn. A teacher functions as a guide .

FOLLOW THROUGH: Follow through is a term that is used to describe the smoothness needed for many muscular accomplishments. In golf or tennis, a player must follow through to make his swing become an even, smooth stroke through the air. Only then will he be able to hit the ball straight through the air. In dancing also, follow through is used to describe smoothness, which is the main requisite of graceful movement. To achieve correct follow through, you must keep your feet in a closed parallel line when walking forward or back. Practice in front of a mirror. Exaggerate the follow through by actually brushing your foot by the forward (or back) foot.

GUEST INSTRUCTORS: If you have confidence in yourself as a teacher, you will (and at least occasionally should) welcome guest instructors. They can spice up a lesson. Sometimes someone else can get across a point in a few different words, a point you may have been working on for weeks. It is advantageous to have students see different styles. Don't be afraid of losing your students (everyone stands to gain from sharing, cooperation, and mutual respect).

TERMINOLOGY AND STANDARDIZATION OF LANGUAGE: Use of a common language or at least recognizing and interpreting differences in terms lends credibility to the CW dance form. Beginning this month, a page or two of Dance terminology will be included with each issue of the 'Memo'.

IN CONSIDERATION OF A CODE OF ETHICS

A code of ethics may also be known as (AKA) a Code of Ethical Conduct, Professional Conduct, or Professionalism. The need for such a code for CW teachers has been raised from time to time, including at the Instructors' Forum in 1994. Some further comment and discussion have taken place since then but nothing formal or organized has come out of any of the commentary. A couple of offers have been made to put something together but that has not yet occurred. With that in mind, the following is a compilation of comments, suggestions and ideas from a variety of sources that support the general concept and philosophy of a code. Some are generic to any code of good behaviour while others are more specific to CW dance, and more specifically, to CW dance instructors. Consider the following and make suggestions for changes, additions, or deletions. Any such code would be aimed more specifically at teachers but should be acknowledged and followed by the CW community in general. Read and respond.

Some think being a professional simply means being paid for or making a living at something. This is a narrow definition. To be real professional means more. It relates to a profession based on advanced study and specialized training in a field with recognized standards, and following some proper and accepted form or style of conduct.

Ethics refers to morality of behaviour and conforming with an accepted standard of behaviour. It deals with right and wrong.

The goal of the instructor should be development of the potential of students to the fullest extent possible, recognizing the situation and interests of each individual. Teaching should facilitate and support learning, and be done in a way that respects the rights, dignity, and expectations of students.

Contractual obligations with students and employers are to be honoured. The contracts of others are to be respected so that nothing is done to weaken the position of another or the bring about the removal or dismissal of another from a contract or place of employment, especially for personal advantage or animosity.

Exclude criticism of other instructors or methods in class. Avoid damaging the confidence of pupils in other instructors. No criticism of another instructor should occur unless the problem has been discussed with that individual and there has been a chance to make corrections. A broadly and generally acceptable forum or process is necessary to allow for any positive, constructive, or professional criticism. Any right or need to criticize must be tempered by the responsibility to do it in an acceptable manner.

Knowledge and skill are acquired through training and experience. Every Instructor has the responsibility to gain and naintain an adequate and appropriate level of expertise for the students and programs affected. That includes the responsibility to continually review personal competence and effectiveness and to make such changes and improvements as are necessary.

Avoid actions that will negatively or adversely affect yourself, others, or the sport itself. Always behave in a manner that will promote, dignify, and earn respect for the Country Western dance form and its attendant community of dancers and teachers. That includes a need and responsibility to cooperate and work with others for the mutual and common good.
