FROM THE PREDITOR

Canadians, and Albertans In particular, descended upon Anaheim for UCWDC's Worlds III and gave a good account of themselves, both on and off the floor. By all accounts received to date, the 'Canucks' had a good time. They also took pride in whom they were - an unfortunate rarity for many Canadians - in their treatment of the national anthem. We'll keep this fractious old country together yet. 'Way to go.

Now that the Worlds event is over, the new season's rules come into effect and there will be some changes to get used to this year. UCWDC has finally realized that there has to be a concerted effort to more new dancers into the circuit and appears to have made a real move in that direction. Only time will tell but the new two strand format should be much more inviting/less intimidating. The 'pros' will continue much as they have in the past. Beginning and 'amateur' dancers who want to out the challenge of competition should now be able to feel that they do have a place on the floor.

Below the major circuit level, efforts still continue on many fronts to develop rules and events to attract the recreational and social dancers on to the floor. Honky Tonk rules in the U.S. seem to be popular and growing. Given the chance to compete against their peers rather than the pros, and given a set of reasonable and uniform rules, a lot of dancers are getting on the floor. That will save some events and be the basis for some new ones. Work continues here to develop a standard set of rules for that purpose and ACWDA will continue to be involved.

Country Pride and ACWDA are working together to bring Kelly Gellette to Red Deer to offer basic level NTA instructor training. This possibility was discussed at the instructors' Forum at the AGM in Red Deer last year and it becomes reality this month. This may fit well with the instructor portion of our Mission Statement and become a factor in meeting that goal. The results will be reviewed carefully with that in mind.

ALBERTA AND CANADA ATTEND WORLDS HI

At least 50 Albertans and a number of other CW types from BC and Saskatchewan were in attendance at 'Worlds III' in Anaheim from January 6 to 10. Many went to relax and enjoy as spectators while other worked the event or competed. From all accounts received, it was a good time. Canadlans, and apecially Albertans, made their presence felt. They were treated well by their hosts and made good on the opportunity to sing our national anthem at the opening ceremonles.

One the competition side, Alberta is once again home to another world champion couple. Miles Munroe and Trista Berg of Calgary placed First Overall in the Junior Youth Division (2nd-

2Stp; 3rd-Wal; 1st-Solo). Jim and Stephanie McDonald from Edmonton danced to a Fourth Overall finish in the Classic Advanced Division (4th-2Stp; 4th-Wal; 1st-Pon; 4th-WCS). In the Regional Dance Showdown Competition (an open contest), Ken and Karen Close of Edmonton finished second in Schottische and Kim Degagne and Pam Tower of Calgary placed first in Triple Two Step. Toby Munroe and Rachael Anderson ran into disappointment when they were forced to withdraw due to illness. Irv Latrace and Cheryl Mayes also decided to withdraw. Congratulations go out to all the Alberta winners and competitors. All of us are proud of your efforts and accomplishments.

The Worlds event saw other Canadians performing and placing on the competition floor. Gary McIntyre and Vanessa Linford from Saskatoon finished Second Overall in Division II (2nd-2Stp; 2nd-Wal; 2nd-Pol; 5th-WCS). Tom and Deb Selzler of Kelowna took third in Pony in the Reginal/Open category. Dan Kovak and Tamera Phillips from Vancouver finished fourth in both Waltz and Polka in Division III. Compliments to all Canadian competitors - you represented Canada very well.

Other items of interest include the results of the Masters Division. First Overall went to Robert Royston and Laureen Baldovi with second going to Anthony Lee and Sharon Leigh. Tony and Yvonne Gutsch took third, Bob and Sara Bahrs were fourth, Larry and Laurie Sepulvado were fifth, and Randy and Rhonda Shotts placed sixth overall. Twelve teams competed in the Division II category with Grapevine Express coming up number one. Only one team entered Division I and Midnight Cowboy finished first. A former Alberta dancer, Cody Melin and Resa Henderson dancing out of Colorado finished Second Overall in Division I.

THE RULES (UCWDC) THEY ARE A-CHANGING

Country Western dancing and the competitions that go with it have changed and are continuing to change. A single division for competitors evolved into several. UCWDC tried an experiment with two strands and then returned to one. In an attempt to draw more beginning level competitors out from the social and recreational dancers, UCWDC has now returned to another two track system with a decided difference between the two tracks.

According to the UCWDC rules, Classic Divisions are offered "with the intent to preserve what the public might view as more conventional Country Western dancing. These divisions are dedicated toward excellent dance fundamentals performed with more traditional Country Western presentation, and are designed for competitors that have more of an interest in 'social'

rather than 'professional' dancing." Classic Divisions have varying movement restrictions and Division IV has a costuming restriction. Competition music for Classic Divisions will not be released in advance except for Champions. The Showcase Divisions rules will be almost identical to the 1994 guidelines and limitations.

Division IV will be the starting level for both strands and is to be a true beginners division. Traditional western wear, including matching or coordinated outfits, is recommended but fancy, decorated costumes are not allowed. Couples must enter Two Step and must begin in basic dance position. Disallowed moves include developé, rondé, attitudes, other adagio moves; leans, dips, drags, other leveraged support moves; splits, jumps; pantomime, mime, theatrics; shine or apart moves.

Division III, Diamond Novice, and Juniors Level Classic allow for costumes. Competitors must enter Two Step and Waltz. Restricted moves are the same as for Division IV. Couples must begin in basic dance position.

Division II, Silver, and Gold Classic must enter Two Step. Welicand a Swing. Disallowed movements are attitudes and adagio moves other than develope and ronde; leans, dips, drags, and other leveraged support moves; splits, jumps; pantoming mime, theatrics; shine or apart moves except for dance entrances.

Division I and Diamond Advanced Classic must enter Two Step Waltz, a Swing, and a non-Swing dance. Restricted moves are the same as for Division II.

Classic Champions restrictions are reduced but not removed. Showcase Divisions face the same limitations that were in place previously. Age categories for couples are as follows: Junior Primary - each under 10 years of age; Junior Youth-each under 15, average less than 13 years; Junior Teen-each under 20, average 13 years or older, Diamond-total ages 75 or more and each at least 35 years old; Silver-total 100 or more with each at least 40 years old; Goldadal 115 or more with each at least 50 years old. For more specifics and detail, refer to the 1995 UCWDC Rules and Scoring Format.

JUST FOR FUN RULES

Just Dance, Just Wanna Dance, Honky Tonk, Let's Just Dance, you name it. There are currently at least four competitive CW dance tours or circuits operating and many of the events offer some 'just for fun' divisions. Honky Tonk may become a circuit on its own in the States.

'Dance country for fun' is aiready important on the Alberta scene. A common format will allow dancers to follow the western Canadian 'circuit' with confidence that the rules don't keep changing. A goal of the Association is to develop or be involved with the development of a standard set of guidelines that will be available for competitions. From the club, bar, or small local competition to the larger festivals, dancers and the sport stand to gain from reasonable consistency. Together we can go further and better.

THE NEW YEAR EDITION

With a view to what was and what is yet to come

THE YEAR IN REVIEW: A LOOK AT 1994

Worlds II opened the year in Nashville and several dozen Canadians were on hand to add their contribution. Seven couples (five from Alberta) placed in the awards, three (two from Alberta) achieved overall standings, and one team (Alberta) placed second overall. A number of other people attended as spectators and participated as staff members for the event.

The past year saw four CW dance festivals readily available for Albertans, three at home and one in Saskatchewan, with a couple of the events experimenting with preliminary contests leading up to the event. Two formal training sessions for judges were held in conjunction with festivals and ACWDA sponsored workshops for instructors were initiated at festivals.

The Third Annual ACWDA General Meeting and dance took place in Red Deer in June along with the Second Annual Instructors' Forum. The forum recommended acceptance and use of NTA Dance Terminology including, some minor variations, terminology and definitions for dance positions. Study and experimental use of the NTA teaching manuals and syllabus were accepted for future consideration. A Teacher Talk column, for but not restricted to instructors, was added to the regular newsletter with (an Munroe volunteering his services to write columns.

Membership in ACWDA continued its growth as did efforts toward meeting the stated goals of the Association. All four western provinces now provide members. A friendly relationship and communication has been established with the Alberta Amateur Sport Dancers Association. The newsletter achieved monthly publication to provide a regular open communication channel for use by all. The first combination dance workshop and membership drive was held in Calgary.

THE YEAR TO COME: A LOOK AT 1995

As this edition goes out, a number of Canadians, including a significant representation from Alberta, are at Worlds III in Anaheim to provide a presence from this side of the 49th. Our representatives are attending as competitors, staff, and spectators. A report or two on that should be available for the February edition.

This year sees at least six scheduled Canadian CW dance festivals, with two in Calgary, one in Saskatoon, one in Red Deer, and two in Edmonton. There has been a hint (without any confirmation) of an event in BC. Work will continue - and hopefully reach some interim completion - on a set of standardized rules for contests leading up to the formal competition level. The 'just for fun' contestants will then face common expectations.

e ACWDA's fourth AGM and third Instructors' Forum are set for June 3 with plans for workshops for instructors and dancers. At least two Zones are considering the combination workshop/membership drives for an activity to bring instructors together, provide a service for members, and increase membership. The Association will continue to strive toward meeting the goals set out in its mission statement. Other events and activities will be included in Newsmemo as soon as they are made available for publication.

FROM THE PREDITOR

There has been some discussion in a number of quarters relating to the Association, membership in it, and the merits of same. The ACWDA was established and has evolved based on a philosophy that avoids affiliation with any specific individual, club, group, or organization. Its purpose was to affirm the belief that there was much more to be gained by working together in cooperation than in pursuing a variety of competing and, of more concern, conflicting directions. Competition can be a positive and useful exercise as long as it avoids degeneration into conflict. The Association was set up not as a governing body but as an umbrella group. It was created as a vehicle to provide a means of communication and cooperation within and among members of the Country Western dance community, be they individuals or groups. That circumstance did not exist prior to the ACWDA and there is nothing else to serve that function now. The growth, strengthening, and improvement of the CW community and the dance form are all ends to which the ACWDA strives and the means of doing that is seen as providing a forum where all can come together or at least make and maintain contact. Choosing to avoid involvement with ACWDA in order to stay clear of the 'politics' in the CW community has the potential of creating the very opposite effect. Isolationism or the setting of one's self or one's group apart is a very political statement. Splintering or separation (separatism'??) can indicate a variety of 'political' agendas. Likewise the attitude that 'this organization isn't big enough for the two of us' seems to be a good indicator of the smallness of the speaker. Not everyone will join or support the ACWDA and its goals and that, although unfortunate from the Association standpoint, can be accepted as long as the reasons and reasoning are rational instead of emotional and selfless rather than selfish.

the club. This is a step toward providing some standards and standardization which should benefit students of the club instructors. Every student can expect to be taught a relatively common curriculum or syllabus which will show dividends when these students get together or happen to change instructors within the club. Congratulations Country Pride. Now we'll have to work on that beyond the club level.

The spotlight shifts to Edmonton this month with the Rob and Sherry Tovell's River City event. Please note the judge's workshop that is good stuff for dancers as well as potential judges - and we do need to develop Canadian and Alberta judges. Also check the program for two workshops sponsored by the Association that are geared toward - although not restricted to - instructors; we hope to have one on WCS and one on Spins, Turns, and Pivots. Support the event and support our dance form.

Other Items this issue include good news on membership, a review of items from the last Executive/Board meeting (a new item that should be included after each meeting), and a new line dance choreographed to go with a song by a new Canadian country artist. We've missed our Teacher Talk column from lan Munroe this month but look forward to it next month.

PS: Halloween may be over but technological terrors still abound. This issue was due to go out in the first couple of days of November - things were looking good - the computer hadn't acted up for awhile (touch wood) - but the new, fancy, expensive, no down time copier I use for duplication decided to take some down time.

MEMBERSHIP CYCLE ON THE UPSWING.

Membership bears more than a little resemblance to the business cycle with its ups and downs, recession and recovery. The membership cycle is an annual one, peaking at the time of the Annual General Meeting, going into an instantaneous contraction due to memberships that have not been renewed by that time, and then beginning a recovery and expansion period that last to the next AGM when it starts all over again. The rate of expansion varies, especially if there are periodic drives to build membership. From a high of 125 members going into the 1994 AGM, there are now 109 current members but that too is a high for this time of year. Membership is up compared to the same time last year and that is true when comparing any other point in time from the current year to the previous year.

Calcary currently leads the membership total with 28 current and 4 not-yet-renewed names. The Central Zone follows with 27 current are 2 n-y-r types and Edmonton is right behind showing 25 paid and 18 n-y-r names. The Southern Zone has 17 current and 3 not-yet-renewed, the Northern shows 8 paid and 3 n-y-r, and the out-of-province membership list has 4 current and 1 not-yet-renewed. There are 9 club memberships which greatly expands the network of communication. The goal of exceeding 150 members before AGM '95 is quite reasonable, requiring only 7 new members a month. One or two membership drives could achieve that number.

EXECUTIVE NOTES

A review of the items from the October Board meeting includes:

- >>>there is still interest in establishing a list of 'games and fun activities' for use at dances and various events and making it available to members:
- >>>discussion is continuing on the development of a set of rules for dance contests within the province, from the simple bar or club level to the more formal and organized 'festival' type events; the emphasis is to be toward 'funtest' rather than contest where dancers can 'strut their stuff' on the floor without the stress or expense of major competition;
- >>>unless the need arises and until adequate safeguards and controls can be worked out, the ACWDA provincial bank account will be the only Association account and separate zone accounts will not be considered;
- >>>options are still being explored to have a workshop or similar activity held in conjunction with the 1995 AGM and a workshop gear toward instruction is a priority; dance workshops will also be considered;
- >>>it was noted that Camrose was the only Alberta Lung Association region to hold a Country Dance-A-Rama this year; the Lung Association has requested consideration by ACWDA for working together to re-establish a provincial campaign again for 1995 after the ALA chose to go it alone this year; the matter will be explored as the Dance-A-Rama can serve a number of positive ends;
- >>>the concept of a ski-a-thon for the Rainbow Society was supported but will be carried out at the zone level by individual zones;
- >>>membership fees were reviewed in light of costs and multiple memberships; mailing and newsletter costs are projected at about \$10.00 per year; on that basis, beginning in 1995 individual memberships will be \$20.00 per year with additional family memberships at \$10.00, allowing for one mailing to each household; junior members will be \$15.00 and junior family members will be \$5.00; group memberships will remain at \$40.00;
- >>>Zone Reports: Southern will try again to have an alternate or co-rep from the southwest and will look into a workshop in that area; Central reported light turnout for the September meeting, another is scheduled for November 27, and Country Pride reports satisfaction and success with their 'in house' accreditation for club instructors; Calgary reported on the operation of their workshop and membership drive; Edmonton indicated meetings for October and January as well as plans for a combined workshop and membership drive with a tentative date sometime in January; northern reported all quiet on that front;
- >>>there will be an attempt to establish a 'clubs and pubs' listing in the newsletter to provide a minor source of revenue and to provide a service to members who travel to other centres;
- >>>work is to continue on increasing the list of benefits available to members;
- >>>plans are in motion for a future edition of the newsletter to carry a special edition to provide a short biography of member instructors.
- >>>the Policy handbook will be brought up to date

T²|2: TEACHER TALK - INSTRUCTOR INFORMATION

This month's offerings come from a variety of NTA materials

THREE BASIC CONCEPTS NEED TO BE CONSIDERED WHEN TEACHING

- 1. Show what you are going to teach. Take care to avoid showing or doing more than you intend to teach this is not the time to demonstrate your best, new moves.
- 2. Teach the material to the student. Break it down into the basic parts and present it so that it flows together in a meaningful sequence be aware that people learn in different ways. Some are visual learners, some are auditory learners, some are kinaesthetic learners, and many use some combination of seeing, hearing, and doing be certain to provide opportunities for all three, especially seeing (demonstration), and doing (practice). Provide handouts whenever possible.
- 3. Reinforce the material by showing what has just been learned, walk through it all, and practice some more,

With a view to what was and what is yet to come

THE YEAR IN REVIEW: A LOOK AT 1994

Worlds II opened the year in Nashville and several dozen Canadians were on hand to add their contribution. Seven couples (five from Alberta) placed in the awards, three (two from Alberta) achieved overall standings, and one team (Alberta) placed second overall. A number of other people attended as spectators and participated as staff members for the event.

The past year saw four CW dance festivals readily available for Albertans, three at home and one in Saskatchewan, with a couple of the events experimenting with preliminary contests leading up to the event. Two formal training sessions for judges were held in conjunction with festivals and ACWDA sponsored workshops for instructors were initiated at festivals.

The Third Annual ACWDA General Meeting and dance took place in Red Deer in June along with the Second Annual Instructors' Forum. The forum recommended acceptance and use of NTA Dance Terminology including, in some minor variations, terminology and definitions for dance positions. Study and experimental use of the NTA teaching manuals and syllabus were accepted for future consideration. A Teacher Talk column, for but not restricted to instructors, was added to the regular newsletter with lan Munroe volunteering his services to write columns.

Membership in ACWDA continued its growth as did efforts toward meeting the stated goals of the Association. All four western provinces now provide members. A friendly relationship and communication has been established with the Alberta Amateur Sport Dancers Association. The newsletter achieved monthly publication to provide a regular open communication channel for use by all. The first combination dance workshop and membership drive was held in Calgary.

THE YEAR TO COME: A LOOK AT 1995

As this edition goes out, a number of Canadians, including a significant representation from Alberta, are at Worlds III in Anaheim to provide a presence from this side of the 49th. Our representatives are attending as competitors, staff, and spectators. A report or two on that should be available for the February edition.

This year sees at least six scheduled Canadian CW dance festivals, with two in Calgary, one in Saskatoon, one in Red Deer, and two in Edmonton. There has been a hint (without any confirmation) of an event in BC. Work will continue - and hopefully reach some interim completion - on a set of standardized rules for contests leading up to the formal competition level. The 'just for fun' contestants will then face common expectations.

e ACWDA's fourth AGM and third Instructors' Forum are set for June 3 with plans for workshops for instructors and dancers. At least two Zones are considering the combination workshop/membership drives for an activity to bring instructors together, provide a service for members, and increase membership. The Association will continue to strive toward meeting the goals set out in its mission statement. Other events and activities will be included in Newsmemo as soon as they are made available for publication.

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OUTSTANDING WEAKNESSES OF "NEW" TEACHERS

1. TALK TOO MUCH You do not need to convince the students of your abilities.

2. CONFUSION Try not to confuse students by trying to teach too much at one time. Keep it simple. Step patterns, rhythm, balance, lead-follow must be introduced gradually. "One thing at a time."

5. AEING TOO SERIOUS Learning to dance should be fun, not a matter of life and death. Relax and enjoy it and the students will do the same.

- 4. TREATING ALL STUDENTS ALIKE Each of the students is an individual. Think of him/her as a friend. Get to know him/her, find out likes and dislikes, and teach accordingly. No two people are alike.
- 5. FAILURE TO ENCOURAGE STUDENTS Everyone needs a pat on the back one in a while.
- 6. TOO ELABORATE DESCRIPTIONS Keep it simple.

ON THE MATTER OF COUNTING

As long as people count STEPS instead of BEATS OF MUSIC, there will be confusion in teaching SYNCOPATIONS. Counting a TRIPLE or a SHUFFLE step as '1-2-3' may make the first lesson easy <u>but sets back teaching 30 years.</u> A TRIPLE (or shuffle or polka) is counted '1&2' or '3&4' or '5&6" according to where it falls in the pattern. PLEASE, never '1-2-3' unless its a waltz.

AN ORIGINAL NEW LINE DANCE

Rick Tippe is a new country singer from BC whose second album "Should'a Seen Her Comin" includes the song "Bad Heart Day". Cheryl of Roberts Creek, BC has choreographed a line dance to go with the song. This is from material that has been passed on to us.

HEART DAY HUSTLE

This is a four wall line dance created to be done to 'Bad Heart Day' by Rick Tippe although other songs could be used. When using Bad Heart Day', the song starts with 7 cracking whip snaps and the dance begins with the left heel forward on the floor. With each crack of the whip, touch a heel forward alternating between the left and right. On the first crack of the whip the left heel is touched forward, left foot returns beside right. At the second crack of the whip the right heel is touched forward, then the right foot is returned beside the left and so on. On the seventh whip snap the left heel has touched forward, returns beside the right, stomp the right foot, and begin the dance as follows:

SIDE TOUCH AND SLAP COMBINATION

- 1. Right toe touch to right side
- 2. Weight on Left, Right foot slap with left hand in front
- 3. Right toe touch to right side
- 4. Right foot slap with left hand behind leg
- 5. Right toe touch to right side
- 6. Right foot returns beside left
- 7. Right foot jumps sideways to right with Left foot following
- 8. Left foot lands beside Right with a click or stomp of the heel

SIDE TOUCH AND SLAP COMBINATION

- 9. Left toe touch to left side
- 10. Weight on Right, Left foot slap with the right hand in front
- 11. Left toe touch to left side
- 12. Left foot slap with right hand in front
- 13. Left toe touch to left side
- 14. Left foot returns beside right

Left foot jumps sideways to the left with right foot following Right foot lands beside Left foot with a click or stomp of heel

TWO REVERSE PIVOT TURNS

- 17. Right heel touch forward
- 18. Right foot step back
- 19. Left foot touch back
- 20. Pivot to left with weight on ball of Right foot
- 21. Right heel touch forward
- 22. Right foot step back
- 23. Left foot touch back
- 24. Pivot to left with weight on ball of Right foot

SCUFF AND HOP FINISH

- 25. Weight on Left, scuff Right foot pivoting on ball of Left foot 1/4 turn to left
- 26. Step down on Right foot facing new wall
- 27. Left foot jump sideways to left with Right foot following
- 28. Right foot lands beside Left with click or stomp of Right heel
