Maybe these have nothing to do with the ACWDA, but I would like to think that we have helped to provided dancers all over the province with a common ground on which to meet and share ideas without judging each other; and that once people really started sharing with each other they began to discover that they all wanted basically the same things! (maybe not in the same order, but still the same things!)

Alberta is filled with many talented dancers, instructors and choreographers, many of whom spent years travelling North erica to get training, and they're good! Each one has been working, to the benefit of their area, to establish a higher quality of western dance in Alberta. One of the things I hope the ACWDA can do is aid in networking these areas to help provide access to some of this information - and talent - and I believe we are starting to do just that! People are talking, people are listening, people are dancing together!

Jerry Smith (our Southern Zone Rep) has a few things to add to all this, but I would like to say that I believe whole-heartedly in the vision of a united group of Alberta dancers, and I believe very strongly that the ACWDA may be the medium by which this may be accomplished.

# A SOUTHERN PERSPECTIVE:

"... We can go further, faster and better if we move together."

One year ago this month, Country Western dancers and representatives of Country Western dance groups from across Alberta met in Red Deer. The goal was to consider the formation of an organization to help strengthen and enhance Country Western dance through better communication and cooperation. Invitations were sent to the major dance groups as well as a number of instructors and petitive dancers. Those who chose to attend - representatives of 9 groups and over 20 dancers and instructors - came from Grand Prairie, Red Deer, Medicine Hat, Calgary, and Edmonton. It was an interesting meeting as the participants were on their best behaviour as they set out to see what could be accomplished if

everyone talked to and with each other rather than about each other. The results were a little surprising and most encouraging as everyone put the interests of dancing first, and the decision was made to formally create an association to be known as the Alberta Country & Western Dance Association.

Representing a variety of centres, groups and individuals the participants symbolized the evolution of Country Western dance in Alberta where even smaller centres like Medicine Hat played a key role in the early development. Subsequent awareness and opportunity have resulted in more dancers from all parts of the province. Increasing numbers of Alberta dancers are now becoming recognized through their efforts and accomplishments as they perform and compete in more and more venues both within and beyond the borders of Alberta. All of this is the result of no single source or influence. Many contributions have been made on a more or less individual basis including the major workshops and events that have been scheduled in both Calgary and Edmonton.

The overall effects of this piecemeal approach can present a variety of problems. A collegial and cooperative approach with good, open communication will benefit everyone and this is even more true for those of us in the smaller communities. Edmonton and Calgary are certainly better able to survive on their own but even those in the larger centres lose out on opportunities when divisiveness and isolation occurs. There is an advantage in supporting each other's activities because it helps to ensure that these events and more like them will continue. By working together, looking at the best everyone has to offer, and taking what we can use for both our individual and collective advantage, we have little to lose and much to gain.

Country Western dance has come a long way in a relatively short time in Alberta and we can go further, faster and better if we move together. If we work in concert for our mutual benefit, we can also speak collectively and with some authority to others on our own behalf, when the need arises. By adopting a broad, cooperative vision, the ACWDA offers a real opportunity to move beyond the purely personal, group or local interests and provides a provincial umbrella organization for communication, coordination and sharing of dancing interests. Evidence of this is already to be found on both local and provincial levels. It has taken time and effort to get this far and more will be required as we begin to look at common concerns and interests in teaching, judging, events and communication. Join us in the search for common ground, together we can provide an Alberta network for the promotion and advancement of Country Western dance. Become a member of ACWDA.

# SOUTHERN SOUNDINGS - a report from Medicine Hat

Nothing major to report from the southern zone. More "country" bars keep appearing but it is still difficult to find many with a decent dance floor. More and more people keep turning out for lessons where they are available which shows that there is an interest in learning the Country Western style of dance. Hopefully more dancers will help persuade clubs and pubs of the need for a few more good floors. Some general discussions have taken place regarding the matter of instruction - and to a lesser extent - of judging. A few people have expressed an interest in the opportunity to become involved with further discussions at and beyond the local level. ### WELCOME!...


...All Founding Members, New Members, and Alberta Dancers.

In April of 1991 an enthusiastic group of dancers braved the on-coming blizzard and met in Red Deer to discuss the formation of an association for Alberta's country and western dancers. It was a great beginning - people were contributing their ideas, were receptive to other people's ideas, and were positive. What a great start! We talked about what we saw as the needs and direction of the Alberta C&W dance community, and with that in mind, an interim executive representing the various regions of the province was elected and given the mandate of developing bylaws for the Association.

TO THE REST OF ALBERTA: FROM THE FORGOTTEN CORNER:

From time to time, some of the folks from the southeastern portion of the province have viewed themselves as being far away from, forgetten, or ignored by, the rest of the province — — or the country or the world if one extends into hyperbole. With modern transportation and communication, that may not be accurate but as long as people feel that way the perception has to be dealt with as though it was the reality. Alberta dancers may hold this perception to varying degrees about their position relative to the rest of the Country Western dance community both within and outside of the province; that needs to be dealt with in a positive and constructive manner. A good solution would appear to be for Alberta dancers to work together for their mutual benefit and to be able to speak collectively with some authority on their own behalf. At the moment there is no way to accomplish any of these things.

The evolution of Country Western dance in Alberta comes from no single center. Medicine Hat was important in the early development and Edmonton moved successfully into competition on both the group and couples levels. Calgary followed into the competition scene on a winning note and then Edmonton hosted the first Canadian dance festival which brought a lot of new Alberta dancers onto the competition floor. Awareness and opportunity have resulted in more dancers from all parts of the province and the spotlight must now be broadened to recognize them. Major workshops have been held in both Edmonton and Calgary and instruction is now available on a regular basis in many centers in the The upcoming second edition of the Canadian. province. Finals Dance Festival in Edmonton should do nothing but support the further development and expansion of Country Western dance in this province and Calgary's plans for 1992 have the potential to carry on the growth and development.

More Alberta dancers are now becoming recognized through their efforts and accomplishments as they win at more and more competitions. Two prime examples occurred this past summer when Alberta dancers were second only to those from California in terms of the number of winners at the 1990 Portland Festival and Albertans took away half the hardware at the Blue Ridge Festival in August. Things have advanced very quickly in just a few years and the change has not

taken place in a vacuum. Where we are now is the result of no single source or influence and no single entity or influence will take us much farther. Many people have contributed to the success and by working together we can only continue to get better.

A collective and cooperative approach is important to averyone but it is even more critical to those of us in smaller communities. Calgary and Edmonton are better able to survive on their own but even they lose opportunities when divisiveness and isolation occurs. By working together, looking at the best anyone and everyone has to offer, and taking what we can use best for both our individual and collective advantage, we have little to lose and much to gain.

An exploratory meeting has been called in Red Deer for April 6th, 1991 and whether it is the time or the place is irrelevant at this point. If some form of an association to work for the benefit of Alberta Country Western dancers is to come about, we have to start somewhere and this may as well be it. If we can sit down together and talk to and with each other, we have more to gain than by staying away and talking about each other. Coordination, communication, sharing, and perhaps some smaller 'fun festivals' in centers outside of Calgary and Edmonton are a few of the things that we might all gain from the exercise.

Our development to date has been the result of the effort, influence, and input of a number of people from a number of places. We have come a long way in a short time and we can go further faster if we go together. Here's hoping for a good turnout on April 6th, particularly from the smaller centers.
